

## '77 Broncos Make Those Miracles Happen

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*Mile High Miracles* was truly the merging of professional athletes with those who hope to play sports. The event was billed as *A Tribute to the 1977 Denver Bronco Football Team* and a fundraiser for Dani's Foundation. What is the commonality of these two groups? One man and a beautiful young woman: Norris Weese, former quarterback with the Denver Broncos and player on Denver's very first Super Bowl Team, and Dani Stell, an active bright young woman. Both Norris and Dani succumbed to Ewing's Sarcoma, a rare form of cancer that affects and takes the lives of children and young adults. Thanks to these guardian angels, the March 6 *Mile High Miracles* was a smashing success for all concerned!

*Mile High Miracles* brought the 1977 Denver Broncos together with family, friends and associates of Dani's Foundation. The event was held in the East Club Lounge within Invesco Field at Mile High. Over 300 die-hard Bronco fans gathered some 33 years later to pay tribute to this amazing football team who served as the inspiration for the phenomenon that is now known as *Broncomania!* Some 25 players and coaches from the '77 Team reunited during the early evening with handshakes and hugs and reveled in the stories of a *miracle* record that has gone statistically unmatched in Denver Bronco seasons since. Although the 12-2 Denver Broncos did not take home the final trophy in Super Bowl XII, they returned to a hero's welcome and the undying adoration from Bronco fans throughout the country. This was *"THE TEAM"* that turned the tide into what we all know as the Denver Bronco Dynasty within the National Football League and we continue to honor the many participants who played a part in the magic of the 1977 season.

The program was overseen by CBS4's Vic Lombardi and News Radio 850 KOA's Lois Melkonian. Following presentations of a proclamation from Mayor John Hickenlooper, Dani's Story by Michele Ashby and the introduction of **The Norris Weese Ewing's Sarcoma Research Fund** by Vice President of Communications for the Denver Broncos Jim Saccomano and a short plea by Weese's wife Sandy, former Denver Sportscaster Gary Cruz presided over the laughter and the tears of the '77 season as told by the coaching staff, members of the Orange Crush defense and the original #7 Craig Morton and his offensive unit. Jon Keyworth ended the evening by singing *"Make Those Miracles Happen"*, the song that was known as the anthem to the '77 Broncos and now the anthem for Dani's Foundation.

They have lost a son and a brother to Ewing's in 2008; I caught site of Kat Leyba, who lost her mother from Ewing's last year; and I noticed a tinge of sadness in the eyes of many of Norris Weese's teammates, who are still touched by his passing from Ewing's in 1995. During those few moments in time, we were all connected by a common thread. And, as Sandy concluded her remarks, we were ALL united in a mission to succeed!

On behalf of Dani's Foundation, we were most honored to have had the opportunity to be associated with the 1977 Denver Bronco Football Team. These are the men who inspired so many during their amazing season 32 years ago and these are the men who continue to give unselfishly to their communities. Their support of this very special event was such a thrill for those of us who are not only die-hard Denver Bronco fans, but for those of us who are working to combat a horrific disease that served to bring us all together on March 6. I know that many members of that amazing team and those fans who supported them during that season of miracles will be joining with us in the days ahead and will help us in our efforts to endow **The Norris Weese Ewing's Sarcoma Research Fund**. By working together, we will continue to make the miracles happen for those in need of our support!

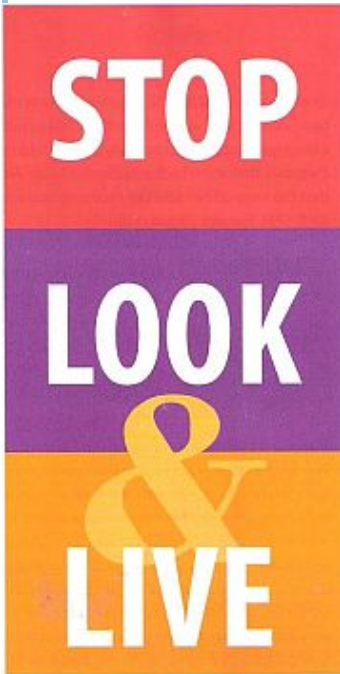

Thanks to the generosity of MiNE, LLC with grants from the Nathan B. & Florence R. Burt Foundation, Sam's Club and WalMart, this community education program is now ready for distribution to those on the front line in dealing with our children. Packets of information will soon be mailed to school nurses, physical education instructors, coaches, athletic directors and trainers with the goal of educating each on the symptoms of pediatric sarcoma.

"Many symptoms are simply overlooked and attributed to typical growth factors or injuries associated with physical activity," explained Program Chairwoman Claudia Cruz. "Dani's Foundation is hopeful that by educating those who deal with our children on a daily basis, we can be helpful in educating the Colorado community on the need to seek out earlier detection with the goal of saving our children's lives. We do not want to act as alarmists and cause undo testing, but should any of the symptoms listed within the brochure persist, we are encouraging the proper medical attention and testing."

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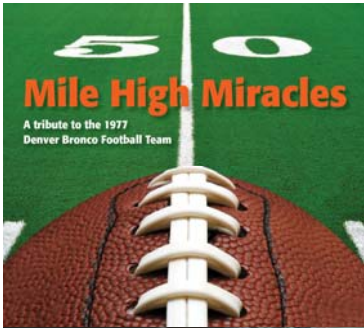

### CHILDHOOD CANCER STATISTICS

- Every year, more than 12,000 children and teens are diagnosed with cancer.
- On average, 46 children and adolescents are diagnosed with cancer every week day in the United States.
- Cancer kills more children than any other disease.
- More than 2,300 children and teenagers die from cancer each year - more than asthma, diabetes, cystic fibrosis, congenital anomalies, and AIDS, combined.
- One in every four elementary schools has a child with cancer.
- The average high school has two students who are current or former cancer patients.
- There are more than 50 types of pediatric sarcomas, and they account for 20% of all pediatric cancers.
- Bone cancer incidence increases between the ages of 11 to 15 coinciding with the adolescent growth spurt.
- Under the best circumstances, chances for a 5-year survival rate are slightly better than 60%.
- Cancer that has spread to other organs by the time of diagnosis decreases 5-year survival rates to about 20%.
- One out of three children, diagnosed with sarcoma will not survive the cancer.
- Early detection is the key to better survival statistics.

# THE NORRIS WEESE EWING'S SARCOMA RESEARCH FUND



Dani's Foundation is honored to partner with the family of Norris Weese to establish **The Norris Weese Ewing's Sarcoma Research Fund**

which will assist in developing a new funding stream for research grants to scientific investigators who are seeking to find the cause and the cure for Ewing's Sarcoma and the other forms of pediatric sarcomas that are affecting and taking the lives of children and "young" adults.

Weese, a former quarterback for the Denver Broncos, died Friday, January 20, 1995. He was 43. The cause of death was Ewing's Sarcoma.

Weese was born on Sunday, August 12, 1951 in Baton Rouge. He played baseball and football at the University of Mississippi. He had the dubious task of following a legend, Archie Manning, as quarterback at Ole Miss. In 1971, Weese led Mississippi to the Peach Bowl Crown.

Following graduation from college, Weese signed with the World Football League's Hawaiians and was named as their starting quarterback in 1974. Weese played one season in the World Football League before joining the Broncos in 1976.

Weese played for the Denver Broncos from 1976 to 1979, backing up Craig Morton for three seasons and starting in 1979. Weese is best remembered for relieving Craig Morton in the second half of Super Bowl XII. He led the Broncos to a touchdown on a third quarter drive to cut his team's deficit to 20-10.

Weese eventually won the starting role over Morton in 1979, but a knee injury during that season ended his career. Weese is third on the Broncos' career proficiency list among quarterbacks, completing 143 of 251 passes for 1,887 yards and 7 touchdowns.

Following retirement from football, Weese worked in Denver as a certified public accountant.

Weese began suffering with chronic back pain in 1994. After multiple visits to physicians and his pain being dismissed as an "old football injury", testing finally detected that a tumor was growing on his spinal column. The tumor was diagnosed as Ewing's Sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer that typically affects children and young adults.

The Weese family is working with Dani's Foundation to endow **The Norris Weese Ewing's Sarcoma Research Fund** that, once funded, will offer annual grant awards to scientific investigators who are seeking to find the cause and the cure for Ewing's Sarcoma and the other forms of pediatric sarcomas.

## **EWING'S SARCOMA ALLIANCE UPDATE**

Since launching the **EWING'S SARCOMA ALLIANCE** in November, much has been happening and Dani's Foundation is working with other Foundations, organizations, medical institutions and advocates on providing additional resources and support for the Ewing's community worldwide.

The initial meeting of the **EWING'S SARCOMA ALLIANCE** was held on November 4 in Miami and 40 representatives from Ewing's organizations and medical facilities joined together for a one-day meeting to determine the need of this umbrella organization in regard to expanding the scope of support to Ewing's patients, family members, caregivers, medical professionals and researchers. "The first meeting was a tremendous success," stated Michele Ashby, Founder & President of Dani's Foundation and meeting sponsor. "It was most rewarding to meet so many who are dedicated to ending this horrific disease!"

At the conclusion of the November 4 meeting, a Board of Directors was appointed and this group has been working on the details associated with formalizing the newly established non-profit Alliance. The Board of Directors of the **EWING'S SARCOMA ALLIANCE** are Michele Ashby, President, Martha Simmons, Secretary & Treasurer, and members include Trevor Dalton, Reed Kavner (Ewing's Research Foundation), and Brad Wolfe (Sunbeam Foundation). Besides working on the details of formation, the **EWING'S SARCOMA ALLIANCE** has established a system of networking that is designed to offer additional information and resources to those who are in need of support. Since the outset, the network has provided resources and affiliate connections to patients looking for immediate support; information on existing clinical trials to patients and family members; and information on new research programs that will help to better serve scientists in need of data and information.

"The networking element of this new Alliance has been amazing," explained Ashby. "To date, we have connected a patient in need to a Ewing's organization in his area, we have made the connection for 2 patients to become involved with clinical trials, we have disseminated information on two research projects and we have fielded many requests for basic information. By having this network in place, assistance is the click of the computer button away for those that need support and it has been most gratifying to be a part of the solution for those in need of support!"

Just recently, the Ewing's Sarcoma Alliance posted information on its website pertaining to a Sarcoma Patient Registry for the Sarcoma Foundation of America; a genetic study of Ewing's patients by the LA Children's Hospital and an national advocacy campaign that is being coordinated by CureSearch. New information is updated weekly on the Alliance's website and anyone wishing to provide or obtain resources should visit the **EWING'S SARCOMA ALLIANCE'S** website for information and support. # RESEARCH UPDATE



**News from Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center and Dr. Jeffrey Toretsky** - The Ewing's sarcoma family of tumors are highly malignant tumors of bone and soft tissue that occur in children, teenagers and young adults. The most common sites for Ewing's sarcoma are the pelvis, thigh and trunk of the body. Ewing's sarcoma is an aggressive tumor. By the time a patient is diagnosed, it has most likely metastasized (spread). For this reason, Ewing's sarcoma often requires treatment to the whole body.

Even with a combined approach of surgery, radiotherapy and intensive chemotherapy, patients with metastatic Ewing's sarcoma have a poor prognosis. However, more than 95 percent of Ewing's sarcomas have a chromosome translocation which results in the fusion protein - EWS-FLI1. This protein serves as a molecular target that may prove to be the key to developing more effective therapies and increasing survival for patients with the disease.

Dr. Toretsky and his colleagues at the Lombardi Comprehensive Cancer Center have produced a biologically active recombinant EWS-FLI1 oncoprotein in vitro, which proved to be no small task. In the past, many attempts failed due to incorrect folding of the protein. Toretsky and his team found that improperly folded protein, although chemically the same as the protein found in nature, did not behave in the same way. This problem was solved by reshaping the EWS-FLI1 to more closely resemble the protein found in nature by using an immobilization-assisted refolding procedure.

Elimination of EWS-FLI1 from a Ewing's sarcoma tumor causes cell death and decreases tumor growth in animal models. "The ability to produce the EWS-FLI1 protein in a test tube that behave similarly to the EWS-FLI1 found in cancer patients will help scientists learn how it causes cancer and will offer the ability to create the therapies needed to inhibit its activity," explained Toretsky.

The application of small molecules to disrupt or inactivate tumor-specific molecular targets like EWS-FLI1 is rapidly increasing. The use of these small molecules to probe biology and treat disease is advancing research towards a new generation of anti-cancer therapies.

Dr. Toretsky and his colleagues are optimistic that the research that they are conducting may soon help those who suffer from Ewing's sarcoma and other forms of cancer. "Despite recent advances in the treatment of cancer, survival rates have not changed for Ewing's sarcoma patients in the last decade. We are working hard to develop novel strategies for treating patients with Ewing's sarcoma who are not surviving despite intensive therapies such as high-dose chemotherapy and bone marrow transplantation. With the latest finding from our lab, we are closer to our goal of finding a highly-effective and highly-specific treatment for Ewing's Sarcoma."

**Editors Note:** At present, Dr. Toretsky is working on toxicology studies that will insure the safety of the medication and the ways in which to administer treatment. Dani's Foundation will continue to provide support with the goal of making these new therapies available in the very near future! # CHELSEA'S STORY



In June 2009, Chelsea Bhajan had one more year of High School to complete. She was involved in her school's musical production, played soccer and enjoyed hiking and camping. She had run for Head Girl, and was a regular volunteer at a Children's Home and a Home for the Aged. The biggest challenge facing her was how to juggle two important events taking place that summer - the Global Young Leaders Conference in the USA, Europe

or China, and the Caribbean Award Sub-Regional Conference taking place in Jamaica. Of course, she wanted to do it all. She was giddy with the thought of going off to college in the next year.

Everything was coming together as it should, but less than two weeks into June, her world turned upside down.

For more than a year, her doctor had examined the small lump on her leg and diagnosed it as a harmless lipoma. It was never painful and though it had grown bigger, it was still barely noticeable. He advised that surgical removal was entirely optional. As school broke for the holidays, her family contemplated surgery and sought a second opinion. The specialist immediately ordered an MRI of her thigh. The results raised enough red flags to warrant an immediate referral to an orthopaedic surgeon in Miami. The first day they met, he did a biopsy and gave the devastating news - the tumor was malignant. Within a week she had the diagnosis-Ewing's Sarcoma. She had come for two weeks and ended up having to stay for almost a year. Her family had to be split, with her mother staying with her in Miami as she underwent treatment and her dad and brother returning to their native Trinidad. She had to take a year off school and put everything on hold. An aggressive treatment protocol involving chemotherapy, radiation and surgery was prescribed and began almost immediately. Ewing's Sarcoma is very rare, very aggressive and very lethal. Fortunately for Chelsea, her tumor was lodged between the soft tissues of her thigh and had not spread to the bone.

Midway through her chemotherapy, the tumor, which had shrunk considerably by that time, was surgically removed. Intense radiation treatment followed, in conjunction with the chemotherapy.

Her treatment has not been without setbacks. She woke up one morning with her hands and feet swollen and inflamed. She couldn't walk without the aid of crutches at one point. It was a side effect the doctors had read about but never actually seen. She also developed infections which affected the progress of her treatments.

Through it all - the hair loss, the vomiting, the nausea, the fatigue, she has kept her positive attitude and her beautiful smile. She has faced this challenge head-on and characteristically opted not to cover up her newly bald pate.

Cancer has changed her life and that of her family in many ways but it has also channeled many angels to come into their lives. Healing involves so much more than medicine and the compassion and support from the nurses, doctors and other care-givers have been truly overwhelming. There are so many good people doing good work every single day in the fight against pediatric cancer. Having the opportunity to meet some of them and have them in her life has been a constant source of strength. They have all become part of her extended family.

As her planned treatment protocol comes to end, Chelsea is ecstatic about taking up where she left off. Of course, there will be many more tests, surgery to remove her port-a-cath and close monitoring over the months ahead. She is giddy again, preparing for the SATs and once again looking at college options.

Next up, returning home and finishing up her last year of high school.

*Michele Ashby and Martha Simmons had the pleasure of meeting Chelsea and her mother last fall in Miami. Our lives have truly been touched by Chelsea, her story and her determination to face the many challenges of pediatric sarcoma and do whatever is needed to overcome all obstacles that come before her.*

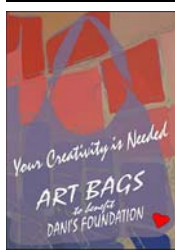
